## Another Successful Launch!

The scenic Inner Harbor in Baltimore, Maryland, hosted the national release of Population Connection's latest addition to the Kid-Friendly Cities Report Card series: 239 Good Ideas from 239 Cities.

At a press conference covered by several print and television reporters, Population Connection staff and President Peter H. Kostmayer unveiled 239 Good Ideas from 239 Cities, which recognizes homegrown, kid-friendly projects from every city in America with a population of 100,000 or more. Through its extensive website, the report provides easy access to a database of ideas and contacts that communities across the U.S. can consult and replicate in order to tackle local problems that affect children. The report also highlights ten projects as Gold Stars—exceptional examples of committed programs in areas such as Education, Health and Family Life, Community Life, and Environment.

Peter H. Kostmayer presented the first-ever Gold Star Award to the Campaign for Our Children, a Baltimore-based educational media campaign organization, which has played a central role in the dramatic decrease in Maryland's teen pregnancy rates. "Just think of this report as a way of using cyberspace to help you help your city," said Peter. He urged everyone to "Log on. Get inspired. Share ideas. Start a new project. And experience how people are making the connection between kids, population and the quality of life where they live, and changing America one idea at a time."
